



Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act, 1974 (FERPA)

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) is a federal law that outlines how most colleges and Universities in the United States maintain their student files and it is intended to help protect each student's record. FERPA is not intended to replace direct communication between the student and their parent or guardian and we encourage each student to have a healthy dialogue about their academic success with their family.

Students who are enrolled at a college or university are considered as independent, regardless of their age, and their records at Post University are confidential. Students may, however, consent to the disclosure of their records in writing. This form will provide students the opportunity to share information with a parent or guardian.
